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Free coin counting machines walmart

Coinstar is one of the leading names in coin counters. But you usually pay a fee for the service, and that fee can eat into your big haul time. Fortunately, there are a few other ways to turn those coins into something easier to spend. How to Find Coinstar Alternatives That Really Are Free If you've got kids like me, the easiest and most accessible of all free Coinstar alternatives is child labor. That is, get the kids to count their loosely changed jars and roll the coins themselves! No of the nation's Big 4 banks - Bank of America, Chase, Citibank and Wells Fargo - as well as regional super-banks like PNC or CapitalOne offer free Coinstar alternatives anymore. So with all the uncertainty out there, your best bet is to find a local credit union or small community bank that will count your changes for free. A few years ago, my children saved a lot of coins. I promised them we'd take the jar and take it. My son guessed the whole jar would add up to \$56.33. I guess it would be somewhere in the \$39 range, and my daughter guessed it would be \$100. Whatever it is, I know we want cash - not a gift card with the value of our money loaded into it. I'll discuss that option later in this article. So my kids and I started hunting for a free coin counting machine. My first thought was to check out my local grocery store because I know what it looks like, at a quick glance, is a free Coinstar alternative. I was surprised to find that public coin counters would lose 9% of what children saved. So that's a no-go for us. When you think about it, paying 9% is like being ripped off with a discount when you consider that Coinstar says you will usually have to pay an 11.9% fee to change your coins into cash! So our search for Coinstar alternatives without beating us over the top with fees is still on. (Editor's note: Most Coinstar machines also offer options donate your money to charity. That usually involves a 7.5% fee. Look at your Credit Union for Free Alternatives Coinstar After the grocery store, my next thought is to check the credit union down the street. I know it has a machine, too. In keeping with the credit union ethos of putting customers first, I was pleased to see it had a computer that Count coins, and this service is free as a courtesy for members. (Non-members must pay a 10% fee. Ouch!) Fortunately, we are members of the credit union. So we started the process of loading our coins into the machine... Loading and counting takes a total of about five minutes. It was a lot shorter than the five months it took for my kids to save all those coins. After the machine spat out the rejection - which included a few half-eaten coins and no less than four chuck E. Cheese's cards - we finally got a tally. We were very pleased with our haul - \$56.14 - which was remarkably close to guessing my son at the start of our odyssey coin count. So we took the cash and now we will invest it with one of our favorite low-cost investment services. How to avoid fees? Even if you are at a Coinstar machine I mentioned earlier that you can change yours and turn it into something you can use to make purchases at a particular retailer or restaurant. The great thing about this option is that Coinstar does not charge to give you your full cash value as an eGift card. Coinstar partners with a variety of well-known retailers and restaurants to make this a good choice for some people. It's fun to take a jar of coins and watch it fill up as time goes by. However, there comes a time when you need to exchange some coins for cash. So what do you do? It's not like you can buy airfare with coins (well, you can try). To help you get the best out of your coins, this article suggests 15 places where you can bring your coins and exchange them for cash (for free or for a low fee). However, be warned that the self-checkout kiosks suggested in this article are places where you can use your coins. The reason for this is that doing so helps make the best of your coins (by paying for something you'll pay for anyway) without wasting your time rolling coins or paying an exchange fee. If don't care about this option, just skip the self-checkout kiosk section. 15 Places to Bring Your Coins to Receive Free Cash (or Cheap) Content Tables ChainsSelf-Checkout KiosksCoinstar Kiosks Chains 1. Your local bank or credit union or credit union branch may allow you to exchange coins for cash through coin counters, allowing you to your own coins, or take coins the other way. However, not all bank branches have this option and may vary from branch to branch. For example, while one location may have a coin counter, another will cause you to scroll your coins. Before redeeming coins for cash, you can call your local branch to check if they took the coins. Also, check to see if they will roll coins for you or if you need to do so yourself. You will need to buy the roll papers yourself or it will be provided when you get there (you should ask nicely if you can get these papers for free. Maybe they'll give you a few free sheets)? Is there a fee if you want to transfer coins for cash? Also, check that members and non-members can trade coins in cash at a local branch. Many banks allow members to trade coins for free but will charge non-members. Or, they may not allow non-members to trade coins. Either way, it doesn't hurt to check. 2. QuikTrip QuikTrip is a chain of gas stations and convenience stores operating in 11 states. There are over 800 QuikTrip locations, including convenience stores and gas stations. In light of the national coin shortage, QuikTrip is offering to trade cash for your coins for free - meaning there is no fee when exchanging coins for cash. If QuikTrip doesn't have enough cash when you withdraw cash in coins, the store will give you a QuikTrip gift card for the remaining balance. Self-payment kiosks If you don't want to spend time counting and rolling coins, check that your bank allows you to exchange coins for cash or potentially be charged for currency exchange for cash, you can use your coins to make part or all payments for purchases. Most cashiers don't like counting coins and giving a cashier a lot of coins can gain you some glares from other customers to hold up the line. Therefore, self-payment kiosks may be the best option for paying in coins. Here are some shops that have self-paying kiosks that accept cash and coins. 3. Safeway Safeway is not only one of the companies with a self-checkout kiosk, but also one of the stores that accept Apple Pay (this information is for those who want to use contactless payments to pay for their groceries). There are more than 1,300 Safeway stores throughout the United States. So you can find a local Safeway store near you if you haven't yet shopping at one. 4. Walmart Ah, the famous retail chain giant! Walmart not only operates in the United States, but also has locations and offices in more than 20 countries. There are more than 3,500 Walmart supermarkets throughout the United States and Walmart is available in all 50 states. Most supermarkets have self-payment kiosks that accept cash, coins and debit or credit cards. Some kiosks may not accept cash, but these exceptions will have a sign or poster to inform you of this fact. 5. Goals Did you know that the U.S. population lives within 10 miles of a Target store, according to the Target corporate website on its Target website. There are nearly 1,900 Target stores nationwide and they are available in all 50 states. Most Target stores have self-checkout kiosks. These self-payment kiosks accept cash, coins or debit or credit cards. 6. Lowe's Lowe operates in all 50 states throughout the United States. As of May 2020, there are nearly 2,000 Lowe stores (1,970 stores) in both the United States and Canada. However, not all of Lowe's stores have self-paying kiosks, although most of them do so. One complaint that a few people have about Lowe's self-paying kiosks is that they sometimes refuse money bills, even if they are not fake. So if you find yourself frustrated with a self-checkout kiosk at Lowe's because it doesn't take your money, don't hesitate to contact one of the employees there. 7. Home Depot Home Depot is a popular location for those who want to buy items or construction equipment as well as home improvement products. Home Depot has more than 1,900 stores in the United States and more than 2,000 worldwide as of February 2020. Although many Home Depot stores have self-paying kiosks, they are not always possible to use them. Unless you're buying smaller items that you can scan like school utensils, you may need to talk to the staff at the store. Considering many people who come to Home Depot want to buy things like wood and dirt, human contact can be inevitable (sorry shy in-person). However, if you have the opportunity to use self-paying kiosks, do not hesitate to use your coins to (in part or in whole) pay for your order. 8. CVS Most CVS stores have self-checkout kiosks, especially during the Covid-19 epidemic to encourage less contact between customers and store staff. CVS is owned by Walgreens, one of the largest U.S. pharmacy chains. There are over 9,000 CVS locations throughout the United States, so you'll be able to find a local CVS store with minimal difficulty. You will be able to insert both cash and coins at CVS self-checkout counters. As of February 2020, Kroger has more than 2,700 stores in 42 states across the United States. While most local Kroger stores have self-paying kiosks, Kroger recently implemented a new policy for customers to pay in cash: if customers pay more than the total value of the order, they won't receive coins as changed. Instead, the rest will be applied to the customer's next purchase, or the customer can choose to fulfill the total amount and donate an additional amount instead. The store can still give you a change in coins if they have some. However, if you are trying to get rid of coins (why else would you read this article?), you might want to choose one alternatives. 10. Albertsons Albertsons aims to have self-paying kiosks in all its stores. While I have no doubt Albertsons will achieve his goals in the future, must not every store can have self-checkout kiosks. However, most Albertson stores pay for themselves, so take your coins there to pay for part or all of your purchase. With over 2,000 stores in 34 states, you can find an Albertsons store nearby if you live in one of the 34 Albertsons operating in. 11. ShopRite Compared to most of the grocery retailer names on this list has thousands of local stores across the United States, ShopRite has just over 300 stores in just six states. So you can find one of the local ShopRite stores only if you live in one of the states: New Jersey, New York, Maryland, Delaware, Connecticut, and Pennsylvania. While relatively few are fewer than other major retailers, most ShopRite stores have self-paying kiosks that you can use. Coinstar Kiosks Coinstar is quite popular and most of the time, coinstar machines are available at a well-known grocery store such as Walmart or Safeway. You can visit coinstar.com find the nearest Coinstar machine. Otherwise, a Coinstar machine can usually be found at one of the grocery stores listed below. However, to make sure your local grocery store has a Coinstar machine, you may want to check carefully through the Coinstar website or call the local store for confirmation. 12. Safeway Operates in 35 states and focuses on urban cities. Safeway is often a popular grocery shopping destination in the cities where they are located. At many of these local Safeway stores, you can easily find coinstar machines inside the store. 13. CVS With local stores in every state except four territories (U.S. Virgin Islands, Samoa [U.S.-owned], Guam and Northern Mariana Islands), CVS Pharmacy is a fairly easy name to find. Many CVS pharmacy stores have a Coinstar machine inside, so if you ever go there, you may want to bring your coins (after verifying that there is a Coinstar machine, of course). 14. Fred Meyer Fred Meyer is owned by the Kroger Company. There are more than 130 Fred Meyer stores in the Western United States, especially in Alaska, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California. Portland, Oregon is the city with the highest number of Fred Meyer stores. At some Fred Meyer local stores, there is a Coinstar machine available. 15. Walmart Again, we meet retail giant Walmart stores that sell almost everything at a pretty decent price. Most Walmart stores have Coinstar machines available, although this is not the case with every store. Since Walmart is present in all 50 states, it may not be too hard to find a local Walmart store that has a Coinstar machine available. Using Coins at self-payment kiosks You may have heard of Coinstar kiosks exchanging cash for your coins. In fact, you may have seen one while shopping at a grocery store local. However, unless you are willing to accept gift cards in exchange for the currencies you are trading, Coinstar charges nearly 12% (11.9%) such as a service fee, which is a pretty heavy fee. Therefore, this present self-payment kiosks as an alternative to Coinstar kiosks. I understand that this alternative does not convert your coins into cash, but it is a great option to use your coins without paying a fee or trying to find a bank branch that will lose your coins without making you spend a long time rolling the coins up. Most self-payment kiosks accept both cash and coins. However, most of them only accept up to a certain amount in coins. Therefore, you may want to insert coins slowly and not pour the entire bag of coins into one of these self-paying kiosks. It's not a big deal if you pay in coins more than the amount allowed, though. Most likely the coins will go straight to the slot to change and get back right to you. The self-test machine may take a minute or two to count coins, but it is much less time consuming than rolling coins. Using coins at self-checkout kiosks is almost always free, so it may be a better option than using Coinstar kiosks. If you don't have enough cash or coins to cover your purchase, you can always pay the remaining balance with a debit or credit card. Exchange coins in cash Using the Coinstar Machine Coinstar machine can be one of the most familiar ways to exchange coins for cash. Coinstar used to charge a lower service fee, but for now, the company accounts for 11.9% of the money you're exchanging. That's nearly \$12 for every \$100 you exchange. Thankfully, there is a way to get around this service charge: exchange your coins for a gift card instead of bringing home some cash. If you choose to receive a gift card, such as an Amazon gift card (Amazon is everywhere these days), an 11.9% fee will be waived. In addition, if you choose to donate your coins, this fee will also be waived. If you have a small amount of change and don't want to receive a gift card or don't think a gift card is worth it, giving your money can be a good choice. Not to mention, you can make a change (not intended to pun) in someone's life potentially and return it to the community. Conclusion Consider the four options you must make the most of your coins: Find a local bank or credit union branch and see if they accept coins for cashGo to the QuikTrip location and exchange coins for cashUse coins to pay for part or all purchases at self-payment kiosksUse coinstar machines and exchanges cash coins (11.9% fee) or gift cards (no charge) Each option has pros and cons, and these pros and cons can vary from person to person. For example, one person may have access to a QuikTrip local store, but another has access to self-paying kiosks.
